### A Note from Pastor Todd...

1 John 4

I am continuing with my 'series' on some of my favorite passages of scripture. This month is 1 John 4:7-12...

"<sup>7</sup> Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. <sup>8</sup>Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. <sup>9</sup>God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. <sup>10</sup>In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. <sup>11</sup>Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. <sup>12</sup>No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us."

The letter of 1 John was written to a group of believers facing conflict and division. Scholars believe it was penned toward the end of the first century, during a time when the early church was grappling with theological disagreements, particularly about the nature of Christ. Some members of the community were spreading teachings that contradicted the apostles' understanding of Jesus as both fully divine and fully human. These divisions threatened the unity of the early church, and the author of 1 John sought to remind believers of the core of their faith: the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ.

In this passage, the writer emphasizes that God's love is not just a theological concept, but something real and tangible, made known through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. God's love is not static; it is meant to be lived out through us. The call to "love one another" is the very heart of the Christian life, and it is through this love that we reflect God's presence in the world. This ancient call to love is frankly no less relevant to us today than when it was written. We are supposed to try and commit to a radical way of living rooted in the love of God. But it's not just a sentimental call—it's a transformative invitation to embody God's love in our relationships, actions, and community.

Aside from a fundamental belief that God is first, foremost, and always love, this is a favorite passage of mine because I believe – as I have mentioned multiple times from the pulpit – that one way to read the Bible is as a love story. God made creation and then loved – and still loves it – so much that at no point was God willing to give up. No matter how many times God's people tried to go their own way, or didn't listen, or didn't do what was asked of them, God never gave up. And still doesn't. And on the days where I'm having a hard time tolerating someone else, I try and remember all the times I've made a mess in my own life and God has not given up on me.

In a time where we often find ourselves divided—whether by opinions, backgrounds, or personal struggles—this passage reminds us of our responsibility as people who call ourselves representatives of God. We are invited to put aside whatever may divide us and, instead, draw closer to one another through acts of compassion, humility, and grace. The words of a hymn immediately come to mind, "And they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love..."

an interest in bees this may be the place for you. If you have any questions please contact Arlo Amstutz.



## Replacement Windows & Donations...

This announcement is a update on the financial status of the replacement windows for the Sanctuary of SPC, not only windows, but interior and exterior painting, including the repair/replacement of the sagging steps leading to the front of the church, and three sanctuary exterior doors. Currently the church has funds from the Building Fund, various memorials, and miscellaneous accounts to pay for the new windows, which have been ordered. Many of you have expressed a desire to donate to the "Window Fund," and may be disappointed to find out that the windows were already funded. Those of you that would like to donate to the window fund, send in your donations, the funds currently set aside for the windows will be used to fund the other Sanctuary projects already mentioned. However the "Window Fund" really needs to be relabeled as the "Sanctuary Fund" to

cover all the repairs and needs of the Sanctuary, not just the windows replacement. Price quotes are currently being collected for the painting of the Sanctuary both inside and out, including upgrading and repairing of both interior and exterior lighting for the campus.

With a Sanctuary that is 100 years old, there is always going to be the need for repairs and maintenance, so funds are always going to be needed to fund future maintenance expenses.
